Collapsed house; Tent City. Along with Haitians throughout the area affected by the earthquake, many Marechal residents live in tents or under tarps because houses are destroyed or badly damaged and in danger of collapsing in after-shocks.

### Marechal School



Mama Carol's well at the school. The well was not damaged by the earthquake.

Demolition of two-story building which had housed the kitchen, cafeteria and classrooms.

Cracks in other buildings which are becoming larger due to aftershocks and rains.

## HEROES OF SAVANNAH SCHOOL

Located just outside of Leogane, the epicenter of the earthquake, the school sustained minor damage to the wall, but the classrooms were undamaged. The classroom at the end of the building in the picture at left is the newly completed classroom.



## SUE WITT'S ORPHANAGE Port au Prince

Gate, damaged wall. Pastor Charlemagne Franck (who drove and escorted Martin Horeis and Bill Roen on this trip), Sue Witt, Martin Horeis and children of orphanage.



Children, worried about building collapse, sleep outside. Sue Will with baby Richardson. On the last night Horeis and Roen were in Port au Prince, it rained, and the children had to sleep inside. They slept very near the door so they could escape if the earth shook.

## CHRISTIANVILLE

The Bible College founded by Carol Herget. There is virtually no damage to the stairs, but the building was destroyed.



Damage to the Building where clinic doctors lived; Tent, relatively undamaged high school building, now housing the clinic.

## VILLAGE OF HOPE SCHOOL (Ganthier)



The school was largely undamaged by the earthquake. Mural of Jesus and Haitian child painted by Pastor Bill Roen and his son Paul in the school chapel in early 1990's.



## LAMB CENTER

Sue Witt's orphanage was in this building until late 2008. Mural was painted by TIVOH team in 2008. Building collapsed with loss of life.

## MISSION NEAR GANTHIER



Pastor Franck took Horeis and Roen to small church and school on the way to the Village of Hope school in Ganthier. The school is made of corrugated metal with a tarp and branches roof. The Pastor and his son are shown in the church which is only the concrete slab with partial walls. But the most heartbreaking aspect is the situation of the well. Like Marechal before Mama Carol's well, this community has no clean water. A man hand-dug a 120 ft. well (shown at left), but they need a submersible pump and power—either solar or a generator—to get the water from the well.
