New International Village of Hope Supporters

Our financial picture since the earthquake has been outstanding.

Income through March 12 was \$37, 319.14, including \$2,142 designated for Sue Witt's orphanage and \$1,400 designated for the Christianville Medical Clinic.

We have also added new supporters to our mailing list. Several groups have come together to help our organization.

Mrs. Kenney's Pre-K class in Homosassa FL (shown at left) made a commitment for their new friends in Haiti. Their whole school helped them raise \$256.89 for The International Village of Hope.

Expenses were \$15,081.34 (including the amounts designated for the orphanage and clinic).

In addition to our normal expenses--salaries, food for the hot lunches for the children, etc. --the January-March expenses also included the first costs of rebuilding/repairing the damage of the earthquake: purchase of a new charcoal stove to cook food for the children at the Marechal school, the initial cost of demolishing the two-story building at Marechal and building the temporary structure at Marechal school.

We anticipate that our normal expenses will be higher than they have been in the past because prices are higher since the earthquake. The cost of food, for example, has doubled. There will also be more large expenses coming once we know how much it will cost to repair or rebuild our structures.

The International Village of Hope has purchased 23 durable Coleman tents for Haiti (15 eight-adult tents and 8 ten-adult tents). All are waterproof, have mesh screening at the top for ventilation, floors, hinged doors, and are 7 feet high. They are now enroute to South Florida where they will be placed in a container being sent to the Christianville/Gressier/Marechal area.
